
















"People's Self-Help Housing's Home Ownership program has had a positive impact on our lives. As a single parent, I never imagined having the opportunity to qualify for buying a home.

# Changing Lives through Home Ownership

Breaking ground on a new home ownership project generally takes 3-4 years as we work with local jurisdictions, community stakeholders, federal programs, and state agencies. This includes obtaining design approval, performing environmental review, securing grants and mortgages, and installing public improvements. This highly collaborative process is currently working to bring **170+ new homes** to the Central Coast.



### Places to Call Home

Acquiring and developing land is increasingly difficult, especially in one of the most expensive real estate markets in the US. However, careful planning and strategic partnerships are currently working to bring nearly **1,000 new units** to the Central Coast.

We broke ground on two new sites: Buellton Garden Apartments in Buellton and Cleaver & Clark Commons in Grover Beach.

Two new properties also opened their doors this year: Broad Street Place in San Luis Obispo and Pismo Terrace in Pismo Beach!

"When they opened the door, I was like, 'This is mine?' I've never had this before, but it's changed my life so much."






"Both of my parents dedicated their lives to agriculture. My father organized farmworkers to join Cesar Chavez in the fight for improved wages and housing conditions.



Funded by Morgan Stanley, this innovative, wealth-building program provides participants with:

- Highly discounted access to a commercial commissary kitchen
- \$2,000 in startup expenses
- Bilingual support from the Cal Poly SLO Center for Innovation and Entrepreneurship
- 2 Cal Poly interns to support marketing and logistics

This year, four participants have been working to create a culinary business of their own, ranging from bagel shops, to bakeries, Mexican eateries to Afghanistani restaurants.



Dedicated maintenance teams provide around-the-clock support to **59 properties** in the PSHH portfolio. From preventative maintenance to emergency response and expansive rehabilitations, these members of the team have been hard at work this year keeping sites beautiful and safe.










Funded through a generous grant from Wells Fargo, **Wealth Warriors** is a wealth-building program aimed at empowering PSHH residents to heal money wounds, establish financial literacy, and make their money work for them. The program, taught by author Linda Garcia, provided in-person lessons on brokerage accounts, stocks, and basic economics.

Participants received all the tools needed to support their learning journey as well as \$500 to kickstart their investment portfolio. This one-of-a-kind program has completed its first cohort and hopes to expand and continue offerings in the future!

# The Path to Lifelong Learning

Camino Scholars supports younger students with innovative math and literacy skill-building programs. Offering a **20:1 student-educator ratio**, students are never far from the support they need to build a strong academic foundation. The College Club portion of the program prepares students bound for higher education through application assistance, financial aid navigation, career exploration, campus visits, and ongoing mentorship.

6<sup>th</sup> grade student, Citlalli, has been part of Camino Scholars for the past six years and counting! When she joined, Citlalli was struggling with reading and math, which was only worsened by Covid-19.

Citllalli's perseverance and dedication to her studies in the years since have shown great results! With support from her onsite educator and the resources of the Camino Scholars classroom, she is now confident and excelling in her reading and math comprehension.

She has been open to reaching out for help and her teachers are proud that she is using the tools at her disposal to reach her goals!









Students go beyond the classroom with a dynamic slate of field trip enrichment. They are exposed to new sectors of their community and learn about cooking, nature, art, history, and so much more!

# Supportive Housing

To meet the needs of our residents, many of whom are transitioning from years of housing instability, we combine compassionate property management with service-enriched supportive housing. Residents have access to free, confidential, clinical case management and onsite care. Whether it's a small bump in the road or a long-term challenge, the **Supportive Housing Program** plays a key role in a return to stability.

Jeremy\* faced challenges with his employment disability claim after undergoing open-heart surgery. With the support of his PSHH social worker, an appeal was filed.

While waiting seven months for his hearing, Jeremy's social worker helped him apply for permanent Social Security Disability, CalFresh benefits, and found interin financial assistance to help reduce his rent.

Thanks to the help of the Supportive Housing Program, Jeremy not only succeeded through a complicated, stressful experience, but he also won his disability appeal - helping re-achieve stability for his whole family!

After beginning her search, the second place Tara applied to accepted her application! Over the moon to begin this next chapter of her journey, Tara shared: "I really want to thank my social worker at People's Self-Help Housing. He is a rockstar! He guided me through the whole process and I'm grateful for his support."

The **Resident Assistance Fund** has been providing emergency financial support for medical, food and utilities to PSHH residents in deep need for over two decades. Funds are utilized when all other potential resolutions and community resources have been exhausted. Each year, thousands of dollars are distributed to those facing urgent financial emergencies.

Mollie\* is a PSHH resident who encountered some tough times, leading her to fall behind on rent. As a single mother, she worked hard to provide for her family,

Through the Resident Assistance Fund, and guidance from her PSHH Social Worker, Mollie secured temporary rent assistance. This allowed her to start fresh, save an emergency fund, and continue setting a new, strong foundation for her family.




